In addition, Liechtenstein School of Art attaches great importance to long-term cooperation and constructive collaboration with cultural and educational institutions as well as companies at home and abroad.

The School of Art is a place of education and further training for the development of the creative perception, design and expressiveness of all interested parties, irrespective of age and ability.

The School of Art strives to be regarded as a hub of artistic creativity and of the diverse cultural institutions and stakeholders in Liechtenstein and the region. It aims to be a meeting place for artists and for people interested in art.

KEY FOCUSES

FOUNDATION COURSE IN DESIGN

For all those who wish to spend a year immersed in the topic of art and design in order to explore their artistic potential or to obtain in-depth knowledge.

During the course of this wide-ranging school year, around 20 highly qualified teachers drawn from 26 different specialist fields and disciplines provide optimal preparation for further training in the creative field.

«GESTALTERISCHER VORKURS»

With five school days of eight lessons each per week, the teaching workload is correspondingly compact and intensive. The school holidays correspond to the Liechtenstein holiday calendar.

The first semester focuses on teaching basic subjects within a thematic context. During the second semester, the acquired knowledge is deepened and applied in a project-oriented manner.



"Work experience", organised by the students themselves, is also intended to give students the chance to get a taste of practical experience in a company or institution and to get to know possible professional career opportunities.

A special and valuable highlight is the study trip. Since 2015, it has been possible to provide and finance this through the ERASMUS+ programme for education, youth and sport. It provides access to culturally active European cities and enables students – regardless of their social background – to broaden their geographical and cultural horizons.

Project work is supported and supplemented by valuable cooperation partnerships with a wide variety of national institutions. With corresponding design assignments, these make very practical requirements, which students implement with enthusiasm and imagination.

The school year ends with an independent final projec t assignment. The individual portfolio developed during the course of the school year and a final certificate open doors to further (creative) life paths.









LEISURE-BASED TEACHING

Within this segment, advanced design lessons are provided for all age groups.

This encompasses analogue skills such as drawing, painting or three-dimensional design in wood and clay as well as the use of digital media in photography, graphics and video editing.

Starting with kids, who together with one parent are able to gain their first experience of the colourful world of design, the further range of courses offers a wide variety of concepts for children, teenagers and adults.

The day class for adults also provides a special programme in which the varied aspects of artistic exploration can be experienced in an intensive and process-oriented setting.

Specific donation funds enable us to guarantee children, teenagers and senior citizens in particular easy access to the world of art and design with corresponding price reductions, while also making attractive offers for smaller groups.





CREATIVE HUB

- In addition to multifaceted teaching, Liechtenstein School of Art also strives to offer a platform for a wide variety of cultural and socio-political topics and concerns.
- In addition to events organised by the School of Art, such as dedicated lecture series, a wide variety of collaborations are also frequently established, releasing synergies that enrich cultural life in the region.
- The creative hub projects, most of which do not generate positive returns, are supported by specific donation funds.

As an "open institution and school for all", Liechtenstein School of Art aims to promote artistic dialogue with the following services:

- Platform, laboratory or experimental field for artists and those interested in culture for active discussions (and exchange of ideas) in order to address topical questions and problems of our time collectively and constructively.
- Establishment and expansion of a competence centre for innovation, design and art; a contemporary learning factory.
- Focused networking with and links to educational institutions, associations and societies for stronger roots within the field of cultural creativity.
- Social roots in the region

COOPERATION WITH SCHOOLS IN THE REGION

With specific design lessons for school classes, institutions and groups, value is also placed on targeted broad support.

On the one hand, there is a focus on integrating young people, children and adolescents who for various social and/or personal reasons are on the margins of our society and can best be reached through the nation's schools. In particular, process-oriented and group-focused artistic creativity endeavours to operate within the context of art therapy as a valuable means to help impaired or disadvantaged people.

Through cooperation with schools, the collaborative creation of art without barriers can be placed in the forefront.

In an age when design subjects in schools are moreover being reduced in favour of the expansion of MINT subjects, this seems to be an even more valuable task. Throughout the country, teaching units in design subjects in our schools rarely cover more than two lessons a week. This means most children and adolescents only rarely experience what can be called the discovery of their own creative abilities, and have very little opportunity to learn, acquire and apply the visual skills that are becoming increasingly important in modern society.

Initiated in 2015 and supported by generous grants from the Maria Marina Foundation, the MBF Foundation, and the Guttuso Foundation, these cooperations are also supported by a government grant since 2023.
